#### **Pastoral Care**

Pastoral care is the commitment of EACS staff to the wellbeing of each student. Effective pastoral care is achieved through promoting positive school environments that support the physical, social, intellectual and emotional development of every student. All students attend a 30 minute "Advisory period" from 8:40am to 9.10am every day before the School starts. Students perform different types of activities and play games for their holistic development. In the Advisory Class, students also go through "Daily notices" to get informed about what is happening in the School in that week and what is planned in near future. The Monday Advisory is reserved for School Assembly.

Here students of Year 8.2 and 8.3 Advisories are seen building sand castles as part of a "Relationship building" exercise which promotes better learning. Pastoral care activities like this, in the morning, help to remove emotional stress among students and prepares them better for learning their core subjects. The activity can also help in developing "Fellow feeling" and "Team Building" spirit among students.

The Reverend Mark McCracken, School Chaplain at John Septimus Roe Anglican Community School will be running a safeTALK Suicide Alertness program for staff and parents of EACS on Saturday, November 20.

safeTALK Suicide Alertness is one part of creating a safer and nurturing community where many people are alert to the possibility of suicide, can ask the question about suicide of the other person, listen effectively to their response and then keep them safe until skilled assistance can be found. It is a simple and effective approach suitable for anyone over 16 years of age.

## **Curriculum Focus: Technologies**

The Technologies Curriculum aims to help students develop knowledge, understanding and skills to work independently and collaboratively to create designed solutions. At EACS, the Technologies Curriculum is the framework for many subjects including Digital Technologies, Computer Science, Food Science and Technology, Woodwork, Materials Design Technology and Childcare.

We'd like to take this opportunity to shine a spotlight on long-serving staff member, Petrus Grobler. Mr Grobler started at EACS in 2012 and, since then, has worked with students on individual projects for skills development and collaborative projects for the benefit of the wider school community.

Students developing their skills must investigate the materials and resources they use to ensure they can complete assigned tasks in a safe manner. Mr Grobler's younger students have regularly been tasked with producing items such as trucks, toilet roll holders, clocks and candlestick holders. Older students work individually to create products according to their own plans and designs, making items such as benches and billycarts.

In his early days with EACS, Mr Grobler worked with students on the challenge of limited resources for Outdoor Education classes. His students designed and built the canoes that are still used by students at EACS today. Another example of a real-world problem that Mr Grobler has worked collaboratively to create a designed solution, is the construction of chair trolleys. These large trolleys have helped overcome the challenge of storing and quickly moving the significant numbers of chairs that are required for set up of DMP for whole school gatherings.

We love the way that Mr Grobler has demonstrated the application of the Technology Process to solve real-world problems and we know that his legacy will remain long after his time at EACS comes to an end
