From the Executive Principal



The' New Normal'

Has the 'new normal' commenced here in WA? With relative freedom to participate and organise community and sporting activities, albeit with an ever-cautious, yet measured approach being implemented while one eye is on the fluctuations of the State's COVID numbers?

EACS has seen a return to the planning and implementation of aspects of its pre-COVID arrangements over the past three weeks. The School has implemented a sound but cautious approach and is planning for those elements that enhance a child's experience at EACS, to be gradually re-introduced.

It has been great to see some aspects of our 'new normal' introduced and planned for more recently, including the planning of the Year 7 Camp in June, the training of teams for Country Week, the return of Parent/Teacher interviews and the gathering of our students in Assemblies and Chapel Services.

Free RATs

The State's efforts to ensure that the latest surge in COVID cases does not impact negatively on the State's Hospital system, as well as to slow the rate of spread throughout Western Australia (WA), has come in the form of the delivery of 20 free Rapid Antigen Tests to all students across WA (RATs), disseminated through schools.

Esperance Anglican Community School's free RATs have now been delivered to the school and will be distributed throughout this week. These free RATs will support our students to continue to attend school for face-to-face learning and will minimise disruption to their schooling. You will be able you to test your child at home if they are feeling unwell. You can also use these RATs if your child is a close contact to enable them to test daily and continue to attend school, as long as they receive a negative result, remain asymptomatic, and wear a mask.

The School will commence its distribution of these RATs to each individual student from Tuesday, 17 May, 2022. It is planned that all RATs will be distributed to all students by the end of the week, Friday 20 May 2022. Advisory Tutors will distribute the RATs to each individual student. I would urge all parents to please check their children's bags or request the RATs off them, on the day that you are notified.

If your child becomes symptomatic, they should stay home and be tested for COVID-19. You should notify the school if your child tests positive for COVID-19. Refer to healthywa.wa.gov.au for information on close contact definition, testing and isolation requirements.

Thank you for your continued efforts in keeping our school COVID-19 safe.

COVID - ongoing considerations

At EACS the pastoral care of our students is of paramount importance. Students spend the first 30 minutes of each day in their Advisory group. Advisory time is valuable time where students can benefit from learning opportunities that fall outside the remit of the standard academic curriculum.

For staff it brings the opportunity to lead the conversation through some thought-provoking questioning whilst offering their own life experiences to shed meaning and offer guidance and counsel.

- Morning fitness
- Community service initiatives
- Follow up on pastoral / wellbeing concerns

Educating the whole person - in mind, body and spirit

Curriculum Focus: Humanities

This Term in HASS the curriculum focus is on History, covering content from the Ancient World, Middle Ages, World War I and World War II. The following illustrates a few activities that students have participated in to consolidate information taught in class.

The Year 8 content was slightly gruesome at the start of the term looking at life in the Middle Ages including occupations such as the barber's surgeon, leech collectors and fuller. Some students crafted tools of the trade with ceramics. Crime and Punishment thrilled most with the horrific means by which they managed society. Among the favourite punishments were the brazen bull, rack and bride's scold. We then moved towards the series of Religious Wars between the Christian and Muslim faith called the Crusades. This gave ample opportunity for students to research and share their creative abilities, delivering booklets and PowerPoints to their peers. The last topic for the term included content about the Black Death which many had been looking forward to all term. To strengthen their understanding of the buboes, typical of the Bubonic Plague, students examined how custard filled jam donuts represented the buboe.

At the beginning of the term the Year 9's studied the changes that the Industrial Revolution brought to Europe and how it impacted daily life. Some of the innovations in this period were the foundations of structures that are in operation today, such as the sewerage system. Innovations and expansion of empires were some of the underlying causes of World War 1. Students then investigated the other causes of World War 1, its progression and Australia's involvement. The content included trench life on the Western Front. The Year 9 classes each spent half a lesson in the volleyball sand pit recreating the various components of the trench system. This included; No Man's Land, the Front line, Communication Trenches, Support Trenches and Reserve Trenches. Students enjoyed reliving their younger years with time in the sandpit and were learning in the process.

Historical and Museum Tour

On Thursday the 5th of May students from Year 9 Big Picture participated in a History Walk around Esperance. This was organised with the Esperance Museum volunteer Kathy Hine and Esperance Museum Cultural Officer Lynda Horn. Thank you Kathy and Lynda for an informative and interesting walk where we found out about the history of many locations in town and about Esperance's very own bushranger. We also learnt that most of the Norfolk Pines and fig trees in Esperance were planted in the late 1890's. They were very popular in coastal towns, as they were hardy and held up well to strong winds. Some were planted by local dignitaries, and some, at the junction of Williams St and the Esplanade, were dedicated to soldiers who died during the first world war.



Lynda finished the tour with a talk of the history of the Museum. It was originally the Goods Shed, built in 1895 and was a place to store incoming and outgoing freight. The Bonded Store and Goods Shed use became obsolete



in the early 60's and the Shire of Esperance and Esperance Bay Historical Society efforts saw to preserving the building and in 1976 the building formally reopened as the Esperance Museum, a use which continues to this day.
